# UNLOCKING NATURE'S PHARMACY: CRISPR/Cas9 AND PLANT BIOTECHNOLOGY FOR ENHANCED PHYTOCHEMICAL PRODUCTION

#### Introduction

Plants have long served as nature's silent chemists, synthesizing a rich diversity of phytochemical compounds essential to human health, medicine, and nutrition [1]. From turmeric's curcumin to the cancerfighting taxol in yew trees, these natural molecules are powerful, yet difficult to synthesize artificially [2]. Fortunately, with the emergence of revolutionary tools like CRISPR/Cas9 and advances in plant biotechnology, we are entering an era where precision agriculture can dramatically enhance phytochemical production [3].

#### What are Phytochemicals?

Phytochemicals are biologically active secondary metabolites that plants synthesize through specialized biochemical pathways, primarily serving ecological functions such as:

Defense against herbivores (alkaloids, cyanogenic glycosides)

Protection from pathogens (phytoalexins, antimicrobial peptides)

UV radiation shielding (flavonoids, anthocyanins) [4][5]. For human health, these compounds exhibit remarkable therapeutic potential:

Antioxidant and anti-inflammatory effects (phenolic compounds)

Anticancer activity (taxanes, vinca alkaloids)
Neuroprotective properties (ginkgolides, bacosides)
[6][7].

#### **CRISPR-Cas 9: The Genetic Scalpel**

The CRISPR/Cas9 system (Clustered Regularly Interspaced Short Palindromic Repeats and CRISPR-associated protein 9) is a groundbreaking gene-editing tool that allows scientists to make precise alterations to DNA. In the realm of plant biotechnology, CRISPR -Cas9 enables scientists to enhance or silence specific genes involved in phytochemical pathways leading to

significantly increased compound yields [9] For example, by deactivating genes that inhibit phytochemical production or boosting those that promote it, researchers can now amplify the output of valuable compounds like resveratrol (from grapes), artemisinin (anti-malarial), or cannabinoids from cannabis. Because this process does not always involve inserting foreign DNA, it can be more acceptable to both regulatory agencies and consumers. [10-13]

#### **Applications and Benefits**

Increased Yield of Medicinal Compounds

Targeted gene editing has enabled the scalable production of high-value phytochemicals such as artemisinin, resveratrol, and curcumin [2,14].

#### **Climate Resilience**

CRISPR/Cas9 allows the enhancement of phytochemical stability under stress conditions such as drought, salinity, and high temperatures, ensuring consistent medicinal value [15].

#### **Acceleration of Breeding Programs**

Traditional plant breeding is time-consuming. CRISPR/Cas9 enables trait development in significantly shorter cycles, enhancing breeding efficiency [3].

Case Studies in Functional Enhancement GABA-Enriched Tomatoes: Japanese researchers used CRISPR/Cas9 to increase? aminobutyric acid levels, offering cardiovascular benefits [12].

Curcumin-Boosted Turmeric: Targeted activation of curcuminoid pathway genes in Curcuma longa has resulted in elevated curcumin production, enhancing its therapeutic potential against inflammation and oxidative stress [13].

Cannabis Optimization: Gene editing is being used to regulate the biosynthetic pathway in Cannabis sativa to achieve desired ratios of tetrahydroca-nnabinol (THC) and cannabidiol (CBD), improving therapeutic specificity for neurological disorders and chronic pain [9].

#### **Ethical and Regulatory Considerations**

The regulatory landscape for gene-edited crops remains

heterogeneous. While countries such as the USA and India exhibit openness toward CRISPR/Cas9 edited crops that do not involve transgenes, the European Union retains stricter guidelines [11]. Ethical issues include ensuring biodiversity protection, avoiding genetic monopolies, and safeguarding equitable access for smallholder farmers [14].

#### Conclusion

CRISPR/Cas9 has opened new frontiers in plant metabolic engineering, particularly for enhancing phytochemical production. By enabling precision edits in biosynthetic pathways, this technology offers sustainable solutions for meeting the rising global demand for plant-derived therapeutics. With appropriate regulatory support and ethical oversight, CRISPR/Cas9 based innovations may redefine the landscape of plant-based medicine and agriculture.

# SUPERBUGS AND SUPERDRUGS: CAN PHARMACISTS WIN THE WAR AGAINST ANTIBIOTIC RESISTANCE?"

#### Introduction

Antibiotic resistance is no longer a distant threat; it's a global crisis unfolding before our eyes. Infections that were once easily treatable are becoming increasingly untreatable as "superbugs" outpace the development of new antibiotics. At the heart of this battle are pharmaciststrusted healthcare professionals uniquely positioned to shape how antibiotics are used, dispensed, and understood. Pharmacists are at the soldiers of this microbial war, uniquely positioned to promote responsible antibiotic use, educate patients, and support antimicrobial management programs. But can they truly turn the tide against resistance? In this we can discuss the battle

against antibiotic resistance and how pharmacy professionals can win against the war against the antibiotic resistance. The COVID-19 pandemic further exacerbated the problem, as antibiotics were often used indiscriminately, even for viral infections.[2]

#### The Superbugs and Superdrugs

Superbugs are strains of bacteria that have become resistant to multiple antibiotics. This resistance emerges from overuse, misuse, and poor regulation of antibiotic therapies in healthcare, agriculture, and even household products. A person cannot become resistant to antibiotics. Resistance is a property of the microbe, not a person or other organism infected by a microbe. [1] All types of microbes can develop drug resistance. Thus, there are antibiotic, antifungal, antiviral and anti-parasitic resistance [2][5]. Each year these drug-resistant bacteria infect more than 2 million people nationwide and kill at least 23,000, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Misuse of antibiotics can lead to a loss of susceptibility of a specific pathogen to an antibiotic. In this current scenario, where there are limited

antibiotics in the pipeline, it is important that we preserve the available antibiotics through their rational use. [4]

#### What are the current concerns?

India has been reported to be the largest consumer of antibiotics in terms of absolute volume [4]. Two major reasons contributing to this high use are the high burden of infectious diseases in India and unregulated access to antibiotics in the community.

WHO report released April 2014 stated, this serious threat is no longer a prediction for the future, it is happening right now in every region of the world and has the potential to affect anyone, of any age, in any country. Antibiotic resistancewhen bacteria change so antibiotics no longer work in people who need them to treat infectionsis now a major threat to public health [6].

Each year, nearly 5 million deaths are associated with AMR globally [7]. In 2019, global deaths attributable to AMR numbered 1.27 million in 2019. That same year, AMR may have contributed to 5 million deaths and one in five people who died due to AMR were children under five years old[8].

The majority of the people in India continue to suffer due to limited access to health care. As a result of this, patients depend on unqualified practitioners for their healthcare needs. Even qualified practitioners are known to commonly prescribe unnecessary and irrational antibiotics. In addition to that, issues like inadequate access to clean water, sanitation and hygiene, and irrational use of antibiotics in farm animals as growth promoters further aggravate the issue of AMR in our country.[3] In this current scenario, where there are limited antibiotics in the pipeline, it is important that we preserve the available antibiotics through their rational use.

### How can pharmacists contribute to improving antibiotic use in the community?

There are numerous ways in which we can actively contribute to improving antibiotic use. One of the most significant responsibilities we have is restricting the over the-counter sale of antibiotics. Health workers and pharmacists can help tackle antibiotic resistance by: enhancing infection prevention and control; only prescribing and dispensing antibiotics when they are truly needed; prescribing and dispensing the right antibiotic(s) to treat the illness [6]. A unit dose system implemented in community pharmacies can also reduce antibiotic leftovers at households. Despite these, written guideline intervention for prescriber to do history taking and provision of advice and knowledge of pharmacists and nonpharmacists may not reduce the sales of non-prescription antimicrobial drugs in community pharmacies, drugstores, and other medicine outlets [9]. Patients sometimes attempt to reuse outdated prescriptions to repurchase antibiotics for similar symptoms, or they might bring prescriptions meant for another family member. Careful checks are necessary to prevent such misuse. Educating patients about the appropriate use of antibiotics is another vital role for pharmacists. Often, pharmacists limit themselves to providing basic instructions, such as whether the medication should be taken before or after food, the frequency of doses, and the duration of treatment.[3]

Pharmacist must explain why the antibiotic was prescribed, its name, and whether it should be avoided with certain foods or medications. Patients need to understand the importance of completing the prescribed course even if they start feeling better midway. It is also important that to stress that antibiotics should never be shared with others, even if their symptoms appear similar. As pharmacists whether operating in community or a hospital, their role extends far beyond dispensing medications. They are in a unique position to promote the rational use of antibiotics and improve patient outcomes. For their contributions to be fully effective, recognition from hospital management and government institutions is crucial. Such acknowledgment would not only foster better job opportunities for clinical pharmacists but also drive improved patient care outcomes in India.

#### Conclusion

As the threat of antibiotic resistance continues to grow, pharmacists have a responsibility to assist the war on antibiotic resistance. While the war against superbugs is far from over, pharmacists are essential allies in the fight. With continued education, innovation, and collaboration, they can help turn the tide and ensure that Superdrug remain effective for generations to come. It is recognized that the pharmacists play a major role in antibiotic resistance over worldwide.

# NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (NSS) 7 DAY SPECIAL CAMP (2127 April 2025.)






